

Spiritual Communion when unable to attend Mass on a Sunday

Introduction

Scripture says that when Jesus was at his last supper together with his disciples, he broke bread and shared wine with his friends, commanding them to continue doing this "in remembrance of me." (Luke 22.19) In obedient response, the first Christians "... devoted themselves to the apostles' teaching and to the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and to prayer...They broke bread in their homes and ate together with glad and sincere hearts." (Acts 2.42 & 46)

2,000 years later, we continue to meet together in worship; reading scripture, singing praises, offering prayers, and celebrating with thanksgiving, the Sacrament of the Eucharist (The Mass). This corporate act in which we are fed with spiritual food, and by which we are incorporated into the mystical body of Christ, remains the central act of our common worship. The Church sets the expectation: It is the duty of all who have been confirmed to receive the Holy Communion regularly..."

Many faithful Christians meet together on Sundays and other occasions to celebrate the Mass, while for some, such regular worship is not possible. Those who are ill, members of the armed forces on military duty, or those who work in essential services, may be some of the faithful not able to receive Communion every Sunday.

There are many Christians throughout the world who are separated geographically from where church services are regularly provided. For all of these, and other Christians who cannot avail themselves easily of attendance at regular The Mass, special provision is made for making an act of "spiritual communion", in which they may expect to receive all the benefits of the grace attached to the sacrament of the Holy Eucharist.

This idea is clearly expressed by the Church: "Believers who cannot physically receive the sacrament are to be assured that they are partakers by faith of the body and blood of Christ and of the benefits he conveys to us by them." So then, it is for all who are unable to be present at the Sunday celebrations of the Mass, that this simple service of Spiritual Communion is offered. Christians have gathered on Sunday since the earliest times and we do so today being absent from the community, to join with them in the worship of Our Lord who has bid us to Do this in remembrance of him.

The Liturgy of the Word



The Lectionary usually provides an Old Testament lesson, a Psalm, an Epistle and a Gospel for each Sunday and major feast of the year. The Old Testament lesson has usually been selected because of its appropriateness to the Gospel of the day, which like the Epistle, teaches us of the Sunday or feast being celebrated. On Sundays in Ordinary Time however, the Epistles and Gospels are continuous readings

THE CREED -
